About the treatment

Fulvestan is an antihormonal treatment, which blocks the estrogen receptors on the tumor cells. This leads to these receptors decreasing in number over time, which in turn leads to the disease being slowed down. The medicine is given as an injection into a muscle, often in the hamstring muscle. A dose is divided into two syringes, one in each buttock. You get the first three doses at two-week intervals, then you get the shots every four weeks. It is common to receive the first dose at the hospital and for the remaining injections to be given at the health center or by healthcare staff at home.

Side effects - symptoms and tips

The side effects we list here are the most common and important. They can vary greatly from person to person, and even from time to time. Exercise can prevent and alleviate side effects. Anything from walking to harder physical exercise can help. Tell your doctor or nurse if you have any side effects.

Fallopian tubes

Hot flashes and sweating are common.

Tips: Try to exercise and move around.

Problems with mouth and mucous membranes

The mucous membranes in the abdomen may become dry. Tip: Against dry mucous membranes in the abdomen, vaginal gel, vagitories and softening cream (without estrogen) can be used.

Pain in muscles and bones

Pain, tenderness and weakness in the muscles are common.

Tips: Can be relieved with common painkillers.

Initiative, mood and moodiness

You may feel that you lack initiative, have mood swings and feel depressed

Weight gain

The hormone treatment can affect the body's metabolism so that you gain weight more easily. Fatigue can also make you unable to move as usual. Tip: There is no particular diet or diet that is better than any other for losing weight. What determines is how much energy you eat in relation to what you need. It is also important that you enjoy your eating habits and can maintain them over a long period of time.
